**Standard Response Questions.** Show all work to receive credit. Please **BOX** your final answer.

1. Determine whether the series is convergent, or divergent. State which test you used and all necessary conditions to use the test.

(a) (3 points)  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{\cos(n\pi)}{n}$

(b) (3 points)  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{n^2 + n + 5}{\binom{n^2}{2}}$

(c) (4 points)  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{(-1)^n}{n + 5^n}$

(d) (4 points)  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{9^n}{1 + 15^n}$

(e) (4 points)  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{\ln n}{n}$

2. Find the series' radius and interval of convergence.

(a) (6 points)  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{nx^n}{n+5}$

(b) (6 points)  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} (2x)^n$

(c) (6 points)  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{(3x-2)^n}{n}$

3. (18 points) Find the Taylor polynomial of degree 3 generated by  $f(x) = \sqrt{x}$  centered at  $a = 4$ .

4. (18 points) Find the first four nonzero terms of the power series representation for the function

$$f(x) = \int_0^x t \sin(t) dt$$

5. (18 points) Consider the curve given by  $y = \frac{x^3}{6} + \frac{1}{2x}$

(a) Write an integral that expresses the length of the arc of the curve on  $[1, 3]$ .

(b) Evaluate the integral from (a) to find the length of the arc.

6. (7 points) Evaluate the series:  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} (-1)^{n+1} (0.1)^n$

7. (7 points) What can be said about the series  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \sin(1/n)$ ?

- A. The Comparison Test does not apply here because the hypothesis is not met.

- C. The Limit Comparison Test shows that it diverges.
- D. The  $n^{\text{th}}$  Term Test shows that it diverges .

8. (7 points) Which of the following is true about the series  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \left(\frac{-3n}{n+1}\right)^{5n}$  ?

- D. The series converges and converges absolutely.

9. (7 points) Find a power series representation for the function  $f(x) = \frac{5}{1 - 4x^2}$

- A.  $5 + 4x^2 + 16x^4 + 64x^6 + \dots$
- B.  $5 - 4x^2 + 16x^4 - 64x^6 + \dots$
- C.  $5 + 20x^2 + 80x^4 + 320x^5 + \dots$
- D.  $5 + 20x^2 + 80x^4 + 320x^6 + \dots$
- E. None of the above

10. (7 points) Determine the interval of convergence of the power series from the previous question

$$f(x) = \frac{5}{1 - 4x^2}$$

- A.  $(-\frac{1}{4}, \frac{1}{4})$
- B.  $(-\frac{1}{2}, \frac{1}{2})$
- C.  $(-\frac{1}{16}, \frac{1}{16})$
- D.  $(-\infty, \infty)$
- E. None of the above

11. (7 points) The series  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{(-1)^n (n+6)!}{7! \cdot n! \cdot 7^n}$  is

- A. divergent by the Divergence Test
- B. divergent by the Comparison Test
- C. convergent by the Limit Comparison Test
- D. convergent by the Ratio Test

12. (7 points) Find the Maclaurin series for  $f(x) = \frac{x^2}{2+x}$

- C.  $x^2/2 + x^3/4 + x^4/8 + x^5/16 + \dots$

13. (7 points) Find the Maclaurin series for  $f(x) = x \cos \sqrt{x}$

- A.  $\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} (-1)^{n+1} \frac{x^{2n+1}}{(2n)!}$
- B.  $\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} (-1)^n \frac{x^n}{(2n)!}$
- C.  $\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} (-1)^{n+1} \frac{x^{n+1}}{(2n)!}$
- D.  $\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} (-1)^n \frac{x^{n+1}}{(2n)!}$
- E. None of the above

14. (7 points) What can be said about the limit

$$\lim_{x \rightarrow \infty} \frac{n^2}{e^{2n}} + \frac{n^2 + 2}{3 - 2n^2}$$

- A. The limit does not exist because  $\frac{n^2}{e^{2n}}$  doesn't have a limit.
- B. The limit does not exist because  $\frac{n^2+2}{3-2n^2}$  doesn't have a limit.
- C. The limit  $L$  exists and  $L = \frac{1}{3}$ .
- D. The limit  $L$  exists and  $L = -\frac{1}{2}$ .

## FORMULA SHEET PAGE 1

## Integrals

- **Volume:** Suppose  $A(x)$  is the cross-sectional area of the solid  $S$  perpendicular to the  $x$ -axis, then the volume of  $S$  is given by

$$V = \int_a^b A(x) \, dx$$

- **Work:** Suppose  $f(x)$  is a force function. The work in moving an object from  $a$  to  $b$  is given by:

$$W = \int_a^b f(x) \, dx$$

- $\int \frac{1}{x} \, dx = \ln|x| + C$

- $\int \tan x \, dx = \ln|\sec x| + C$

- $\int \sec x \, dx = \ln|\sec x + \tan x| + C$

- $\int a^x \, dx = \frac{a^x}{\ln a} + C$  for  $a \neq 1$

- **Integration by Parts:**

$$\int u \, dv = uv - \int v \, du$$

- **Arc Length Formula:**

$$L = \int_a^b \sqrt{1 + [f'(x)]^2} \, dx$$

## Derivatives

- $\frac{d}{dx}(\sinh x) = \cosh x$        $\frac{d}{dx}(\cosh x) = \sinh x$

- **Inverse Trigonometric Functions:**

$$\frac{d}{dx}(\sin^{-1} x) = \frac{1}{\sqrt{1-x^2}} \quad \frac{d}{dx}(\csc^{-1} x) = \frac{-1}{x\sqrt{x^2-1}}$$

$$\frac{d}{dx}(\cos^{-1} x) = \frac{-1}{\sqrt{1-x^2}} \quad \frac{d}{dx}(\sec^{-1} x) = \frac{1}{x\sqrt{x^2-1}}$$

$$\frac{d}{dx}(\tan^{-1} x) = \frac{1}{1+x^2} \quad \frac{d}{dx}(\cot^{-1} x) = \frac{-1}{1+x^2}$$

- If  $f$  is a one-to-one differentiable function with inverse function  $f^{-1}$  and  $f'(f^{-1}(a)) \neq 0$ , then the inverse function is differentiable at  $a$  and

$$(f^{-1})'(a) = \frac{1}{f'(f^{-1}(a))}$$

## Hyperbolic and Trig Identities

- **Hyperbolic Functions**

$$\sinh(x) = \frac{e^x - e^{-x}}{2} \quad \operatorname{csch}(x) = \frac{1}{\sinh x}$$

$$\cosh(x) = \frac{e^x + e^{-x}}{2} \quad \operatorname{sech}(x) = \frac{1}{\cosh x}$$

$$\tanh(x) = \frac{\sinh x}{\cosh x} \quad \operatorname{coth}(x) = \frac{\cosh x}{\sinh x}$$

- $\cosh^2 x - \sinh^2 x = 1$
- $\sin^2 x = \frac{1}{2}(1 - \cos 2x)$
- $\cos^2 x = \frac{1}{2}(1 + \cos 2x)$
- $\sin(2x) = 2 \sin x \cos x$
- $\sin A \cos B = \frac{1}{2}[\sin(A - B) + \sin(A + B)]$
- $\sin A \sin B = \frac{1}{2}[\cos(A - B) - \cos(A + B)]$
- $\cos A \cos B = \frac{1}{2}[\cos(A - B) + \cos(A + B)]$

## FORMULA SHEET PAGE 2

## Series

- **$n$ th term test for divergence:** If  $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} a_n$  does not exist or if  $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} a_n \neq 0$ , then the series  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} a_n$  is divergent.

- **The  $p$ -series:**  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{1}{n^p}$  is convergent if  $p > 1$  and divergent if  $p \leq 1$ .

- **Geometric:** If  $|r| < 1$  then  $\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} ar^n = \frac{a}{1-r}$

- **The Integral Test:** Suppose  $f$  is a continuous, positive, decreasing function on  $[1, \infty)$  and let  $a_n = f(n)$ . Then

(i) If  $\int_1^{\infty} f(x) dx$  is convergent,  
then  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} a_n$  is convergent.

(ii) If  $\int_1^{\infty} f(x) dx$  is divergent,  
then  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} a_n$  is divergent.

- **The Comparison Test:** Suppose that  $\sum a_n$  and  $\sum b_n$  are series with positive terms.

(i) If  $\sum b_n$  is convergent and  $a_n \leq b_n$  for all  $n$ , then  $\sum a_n$  is also convergent.

(ii) If  $\sum b_n$  is divergent and  $a_n \geq b_n$  for all  $n$ , then  $\sum a_n$  is also divergent.

- **The Limit Comparison Test:** Suppose that  $\sum a_n$  and  $\sum b_n$  are series with positive terms. If

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \frac{a_n}{b_n} = c$$

where  $c$  is a finite number and  $c > 0$ , then either both series converge or both diverge.

- **Alternating Series Test:** If the alternating series  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} (-1)^{n-1} b_n$  satisfies

$$(i) \quad 0 < b_{n+1} \leq b_n \quad \text{for all } n$$

$$(ii) \quad \lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} b_n = 0$$

then the series is convergent.

- **The Ratio Test**

(i) If  $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \left| \frac{a_{n+1}}{a_n} \right| = L < 1$ , then the series  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} a_n$  is absolutely convergent.

(ii) If  $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \left| \frac{a_{n+1}}{a_n} \right| = L > 1$  or  $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \left| \frac{a_{n+1}}{a_n} \right| = \infty$ , then the series  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} a_n$  is divergent.

(iii) If  $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \left| \frac{a_{n+1}}{a_n} \right| = 1$ , the Ratio Test is inconclusive.

- **Maclaurin Series:**  $f(x) = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{f^{(n)}(0)}{n!} x^n$

- **Taylor's Inequality** If  $|f^{(n+1)}(x)| \leq M$  for  $|x - a| \leq d$ , then the remainder  $R_n(x)$  of the Taylor series satisfies the inequality

$$|R_n(x)| \leq \frac{M}{(n+1)!} |x - a|^{n+1} \quad \text{for } |x - a| \leq d$$

- **Some Power Series**

$$\circ \quad e^x = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{x^n}{n!} \quad R = \infty$$

$$\circ \quad \sin x = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} (-1)^n \frac{x^{2n+1}}{(2n+1)!} \quad R = \infty$$

$$\circ \quad \cos x = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} (-1)^n \frac{x^{2n}}{(2n)!} \quad R = \infty$$

$$\circ \quad \ln(1+x) = \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} (-1)^{n-1} \frac{x^n}{n} \quad R = 1$$

$$\circ \quad \frac{1}{1-x} = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} x^n \quad R = 1$$
