Trig Identities: $\sin^2 x + \cos^2 x = 1$.

Integration by Parts: $\int u \, dv = uv - \int v \, du$

1. (4 points) Evaluate the following integral:

$$\int \ln(\sqrt{t}) \, dt \quad (\text{Hint: Simplify the function } \ln(\sqrt{t}) \text{ first}).$$

$$= \int \frac{1}{2} \ln t \, dt. \quad u = \frac{1}{2} \ln t, \quad dv = dt \\ du = \frac{1}{2} \cdot \frac{1}{t} dt, \quad v = t$$

$$= \frac{1}{2} bt \cdot t - \int t \cdot \frac{1}{2} \cancel{t} dt$$

$$= \boxed{\frac{1}{2} \ln t \cdot t - \frac{1}{2} t + C}$$

2. (6 points) Evaluate the integral, your final answer should NOT contain any TRIGONOMETRIC FUNCTION:

$$x = \sin \theta, \quad dx = \cos \theta \, d\theta$$

$$\int \frac{x^3}{\sqrt{1-x^2}} \, dx$$

$$= \int \frac{\sin^3 \theta}{\sqrt{1-\sin^2 \theta}} \cdot \cos \theta \, d\theta$$

$$| = \int u^2 - 1 \, du$$

$$= \int \frac{\sin^3 \theta}{\cos \theta} \cdot \cos \theta \, d\theta$$

$$| = \frac{1}{3} u^3 - u$$

$$= \int \sin^3 \theta \cdot d\theta \quad \text{odd rule}$$

$$| = \frac{1}{3} \cos^3 \theta - \cos \theta$$

$$= \int \sin^2 \theta \sin \theta \, d\theta$$

$$u = \cos \theta, \quad du = -\sin \theta \, d\theta, \quad | \\ \sin^2 \theta = 1 - \cos^2 \theta = 1 - u^2, \quad |$$

$$\cos \theta = \sqrt{1-\sin^2 \theta} = \sqrt{1-u^2}$$

$$= \int (1-u^2) \cdot (-du).$$

$$| = \boxed{-\frac{1}{3} (\sqrt{1-u^2})^3 - \sqrt{1-u^2} + C}$$
