1. (8 Pts.) Find the equation of the plane that contains both the point $(-1, 0, 1)$ and the line $x = t, y = -1 + 2t, z = 3t$.

The plane is determined by a point in the plane and the normal vector. A point in the plane is $P_0 = (-1, 0, 1)$.

To compute the normal vector \mathbf{n} , notice that the equation of the line is given by $\mathbf{r}(t) = \langle 0, -1, 0 \rangle + \langle 1, 2, 3 \rangle t$. Denote $\mathbf{v} = \langle 1, 2, 3 \rangle$, and $P_1 = \mathbf{r}(0) = (0, -1, 0)$. Then, $P_1 P_0 = \langle -1, 1, 1 \rangle$. Therefore,

$$\mathbf{n} = \mathbf{v} \times P_1 P_0 = \begin{vmatrix} \mathbf{i} & \mathbf{j} & \mathbf{k} \\ 1 & 2 & 3 \\ -1 & 1 & 1 \end{vmatrix} = \langle (2 - 3), -(1 + 3), (1 + 2) \rangle,$$

$$\mathbf{n} = \langle -1, -4, 3 \rangle.$$

Then, the equation of the plane is

$$-(x + 1) - 4(y - 0) + 3(z - 1) = 0, \quad \Rightarrow \quad -x - 1 - 4y + 3z - 3 = 0,$$

$$x + 4y - 3z = -4.$$

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2. (8 Pts.) Find the values of the constants a and b such that the function

$$f(t, x) = \sin(x - at) + \cos(bx + t)$$

is solution of the wave equation $f_{tt} = 4f_{xx}$.

$$\begin{aligned}f_t &= -a \cos(x - at) - \sin(bx + t), \\f_{tt} &= -a^2 \sin(x - at) - \cos(bx + t), \\f_x &= \cos(x - at) - b \sin(bx + t), \\f_{xx} &= -\sin(x - at) - b^2 \cos(bx + t),\end{aligned}$$

therefore,

$$0 = f_{tt} - 4f_{xx} = [-a^2 \sin(x - at) - \cos(bx + t)] - 4[-\sin(x - at) - b^2 \cos(bx + t)],$$

$$0 = (4 - a^2) \sin(x - at) + (4b^2 - 1) \cos(bx + t) \quad \Rightarrow \quad a = \pm 2, \quad b = \pm \frac{1}{2}.$$

3. (6 Pts.) Consider the function $z(t) = f(x(t), y(t))$, where

$$f(x, y) = (2x + y^2)^{1/2}, \quad x(t) = e^{3t}, \quad y(t) = e^{-3t}.$$

Compute $\frac{d}{dt}z(t)$.

$$\begin{aligned} \frac{dz}{dt} &= f_x \frac{dx}{dt} + f_y \frac{dy}{dt}, \\ &= \frac{1}{2\sqrt{2x + y^2}} 2 \frac{dx}{dt} + \frac{1}{2\sqrt{2x + y^2}} 2y \frac{dy}{dt}, \\ &= \frac{1}{\sqrt{2e^{3t} + e^{-6t}}} 3e^{3t} + \frac{1}{\sqrt{2e^{3t} + e^{-6t}}} e^{-3t} (-3)e^{-3t}, \\ &= 3 \frac{(e^{3t} - e^{-6t})}{\sqrt{2e^{3t} + e^{-6t}}}. \end{aligned}$$

4. (8 Pts.) The function $z(x, y)$ is defined implicitly by the equation $z^2xy = \cos(2x + z)$. Compute the partial derivatives $\partial z/\partial x$ and $\partial z/\partial y$ as functions of x , y and z .

$$z^2y + xy2zz_x = -\sin(2x + z)(2 + z_x), \Rightarrow z^2y + [2xyz + \sin(2x + z)]z_x = -2\sin(2x + z),$$

$$z_x = -\frac{[yz^2 + 2\sin(2x + z)]}{[2xyz + \sin(2x + z)]}.$$

$$z^2x + xy2zz_y = -\sin(2x + z)z_y, \Rightarrow z^2x + [2xyz + \sin(2x + z)]z_y = 0,$$

$$z_y = -\frac{xz^2}{[2xyz + \sin(2x + z)]}.$$

5. (10 Pts.) Reparametrize the curve $\mathbf{r}(t) = (e^{2t} \cos(2t), 2, e^{2t} \sin(2t))$, with respect to the arc length measured from the point where $t = 0$ in the direction of increasing t .

$$\begin{aligned}\mathbf{v}(t) &= \langle 2e^{2t} \cos(2t) - 2e^{2t} \sin(2t), 0, 2e^{2t} \sin(2t) + 2e^{2t} \cos(2t) \rangle, \\ &= 2e^{2t} \langle [\cos(2t) - \sin(2t)], 0, [\sin(2t) + \cos(2t)] \rangle.\end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned}|\mathbf{v}(t)| &= 2e^{2t} \sqrt{[\cos(2t) - \sin(2t)]^2 + [\sin(2t) + \cos(2t)]^2}, \\ &= 2e^{2t} \sqrt{\cos^2(2t) + \sin^2(2t) - 2\sin(2t)\cos(2t) + \sin^2(2t) + \cos^2(2t) + 2\sin(2t)\cos(2t)}, \\ &= 2e^{2t} \sqrt{2\cos^2(2t) + 2\sin^2(2t)}, \\ &= 2\sqrt{2}e^{2t}.\end{aligned}$$

Then,

$$s(t) = 2\sqrt{2} \int_0^t e^{2u} du = \sqrt{2}(e^{2t} - 1),$$

so $e^{2t} = 1 + s/\sqrt{2}$, and $2t = \ln(1 + s/\sqrt{2})$. Then,

$$\mathbf{r}(t) = \left\langle \left[1 + \frac{s}{\sqrt{2}}\right] \cos \left[\ln \left(1 + \frac{s}{\sqrt{2}}\right) \right], 2, \left[1 + \frac{s}{\sqrt{2}}\right] \sin \left[\ln \left(1 + \frac{s}{\sqrt{2}}\right) \right] \right\rangle.$$

6. (10 Pts.) Consider the function $f(x, y) = 8x^3 - 6xy + y^3$.

(a) Find the critical points of f .

(b) For each critical point determine whether it is a local maximum, local minimum, or a saddle point.

(a)

$$\nabla f = \langle 24x^2 - 6y, -6x + 3y^2 \rangle = \langle 0, 0 \rangle,$$

$$4x^2 = y, \quad 2x = y^2, \quad \Rightarrow \quad 4\frac{y^4}{4} = y,$$

$$y(y^3 - 1) = 0.$$

If $y = 0$, then $x = 0$, so we have the point $(0, 0)$.

If $y = 1$, then $x = 1/2$, so we have the point $(1/2, 1)$.

(b)

$$f_{xx} = 48x, \quad f_{yy} = 6y, \quad f_{xy} = -6.$$

$$D = f_{xx}f_{yy} - (f_{xy})^2 = 36(8xy - 1).$$

Then, $D(0, 0) = -36 < 0 \Rightarrow (0, 0)$ is a saddle point of f .

Then, $D(1/2, 1) = 36(4 - 1) > 0$ and $f_{xx}(1/2, 1) = 24 > 0$, then $(1/2, 1)$ is a local minimum.

7. (10 Pts.) Find the maximum and minimum values of the function $f(x, y) = x^2 + 2y^2 - 2x$ subject to the constraint $x^2 + y^2 = 4$.

Let $g(x, y) = x^2 + y^2 - 4$.

$$\nabla f = \langle 2x - 2, 4y \rangle, \quad \nabla g = \langle 2x, 2y \rangle,$$

then the equation $\nabla f = \lambda \nabla g$ implies

$$x - 1 = \lambda x, \quad 2y = \lambda y.$$

The last equation implies $y(\lambda - 2) = 0$. Then, $\lambda = 2$ or $y = 0$.

If $\lambda = 2$, then $x - 1 = 2x$, that is, $x = -1$, and then $y^2 = 4 - 1$ so $y = \pm\sqrt{3}$. So we have the points $(-1, \pm\sqrt{3})$.

If $y = 0$, then $x = \pm 2$, so we have the points $(\pm 2, 0)$.

Now,

$$f(-1, \pm\sqrt{3}) = 1 + 2(3) + 2 = 9, \quad f(\pm 2, 0) = 4 \mp 4, \quad \Rightarrow \quad f(2, 0) = 0, \quad f(-2, 0) = 8.$$

Therefore, $(-1, \pm\sqrt{3})$ are maximum of f , and $(2, 0)$ is a minimum of f .

8. (a) (10 Pts.) Sketch the region of integration, D , whose area is given by the double integral

$$\int \int_D dA = \int_0^2 \int_{\frac{3}{2}x}^{3\sqrt{x/2}} dy dx.$$

- (b) Compute the double integral given in (a).
(c) Change the order of integration in the integral given in (a). (You don't need to compute the integral again.)

(b)

$$\begin{aligned} \int \int_D dA &= \int_0^2 \int_{\frac{3}{2}x}^{3\sqrt{x/2}} dy dx, \\ &= \int_0^2 \left[\frac{3}{\sqrt{2}}x^{1/2} - \frac{3}{2}x \right] dx, \\ &= \frac{3}{\sqrt{2}} \frac{2}{3} \left(x^{3/2} \Big|_0^2 \right) - \frac{3}{4} \left(x^2 \Big|_0^2 \right), \\ &= \sqrt{2}(\sqrt{2})^3 - \frac{3}{4}4, \\ &= 4 - 3, \\ &= 1. \end{aligned}$$

(c)

$$\int \int_D dA = \int_0^3 \int_{\frac{2}{9}y^2}^{\frac{2}{3}y} dx dy.$$

9. (10 Pts.) Compute the integral

$$I = \int_0^1 \int_0^y \int_0^{4-y^2} yz \, dx \, dz \, dy$$

$$\begin{aligned} I &= \int_0^1 \int_0^y \int_0^{4-y^2} yz \, dx \, dz \, dy, \\ &= \int_0^1 \int_0^y y(4-y^2)z \, dz \, dy, \\ &= \int_0^1 y(4-y^2) \frac{1}{2} y^2 \, dy, \\ &= \frac{1}{2} \int_0^1 (4y^3 - y^5) \, dy, \\ &= \frac{1}{2} \left[y^4 \Big|_0^1 - \frac{1}{6} y^6 \Big|_0^1 \right], \\ &= \frac{1}{2} \left(1 - \frac{1}{6} \right), \\ &= \frac{5}{12}. \end{aligned}$$

10. (10 Pts.) Consider the region of $D \subset \mathbb{R}^3$ given by

$$D = \{(x, y, z) \in \mathbb{R}^3 : x^2 + y^2 \leq 1, \quad 0 \leq z \leq 1 + x^2 + y^2\}.$$

- (a) Sketch the region D .
(b) Compute the volume of that region.

$$\begin{aligned} V &= \int_0^{2\pi} \int_0^1 \int_0^{1+r^2} dz \, r \, dr \, d\theta, \\ &= 2\pi \int_0^1 (1+r^2)r \, dr, \\ &= 2\pi \int_1^2 u \frac{1}{2} du, \\ &= 2\pi \frac{1}{4} \left(u^2 \Big|_1^2 \right), \\ &= \frac{3}{2}\pi. \end{aligned}$$
